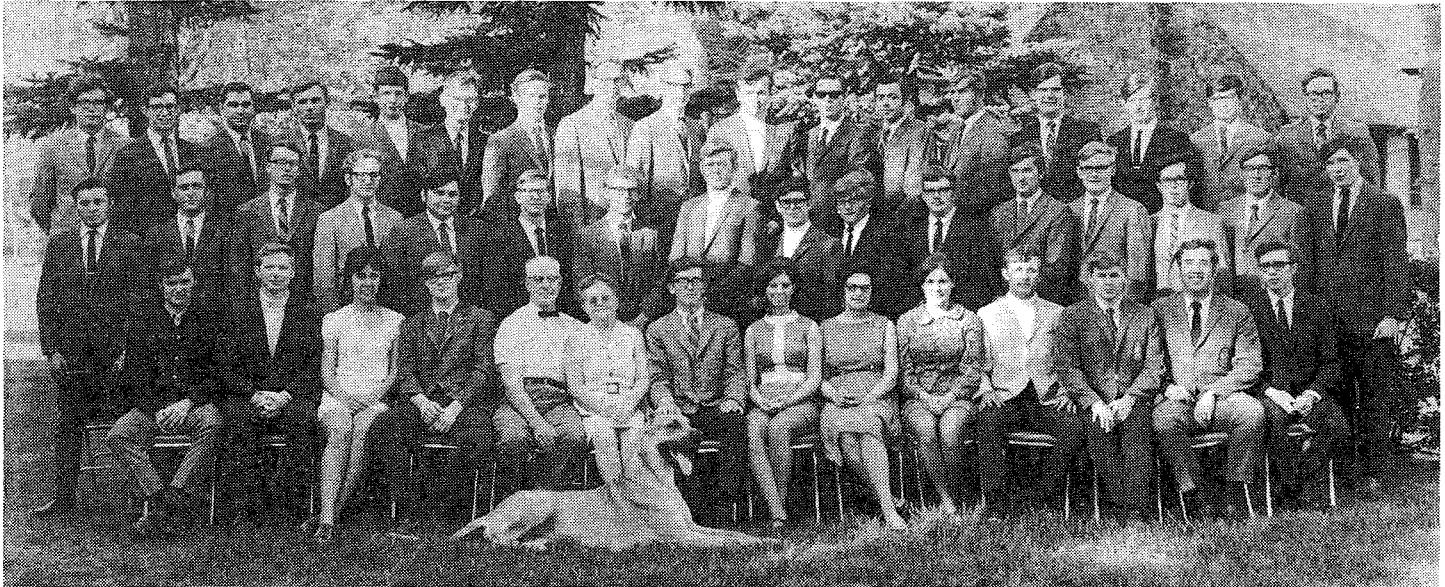

Delts Talking About Alcohol

During Karnea '88 in Toronto, Canada, the delegation from North Dakota discovered that Delta Xi Chapter was rated number one (#1) among our 125 chapters for leadership and participation in the Delts Talking About Alcohol program. We were pleased to be so designated, and are proud of our members for their leadership.

Delta Tau Delta has become a leader among all Fraternities in programs addressing the problems and liabilities involving alcohol abuse. They are recognized leaders in developing a program for risk management for individual Delts and Delt chapters. The National Educational Foundation contracted with the Prevention Research Institute of Lexington, Kentucky to develop the program, and it was tested in 1987 with several

Delt chapters including Delta Xi of North Dakota.

Scott Stordahl, Mark Hoffman, Ryan Lokken and Chapter Advisor, Tom Hanson, travelled to Western

Illinois University for an intensive training course in the fall of '87. While there they became certified instructors of the Delts Talking About Alcohol program. So far 70% of Delta Xi members have experienced the program in the four sessions held. Virtually everyone who participated agreed that they learned something from the program. The

chapter and the Fraternity as a whole has seen the excellence and success of the program. Members are more aware of the effects of alcohol and were cleared up on some old myths about alcohol. Although the pro...

gram does not affect everyone's drinking habits, most members are more conscientious about their alcohol intake. In fact, a couple of members have chosen to abstain from alcoholic beverages altogether as a direct result of the Delts Talking About Alcohol program.

The program itself is a six hour seminar taught by the three certified instructors of the undergraduate chapter. It is usually held on a Saturday at a location away from the Chapter House. The Delt Educational Foundation of Delta Xi financially supports the renting of a meeting room at a local convention hall, and provides a meal for each individual who attends. This further proves that the Educational Foundation is working at both the national and the local levels to help bring productive programs such as Delts Talking About Alcohol to the undergraduate chapter.



D. Wade Robinson, MD '36, '37 Passes Away

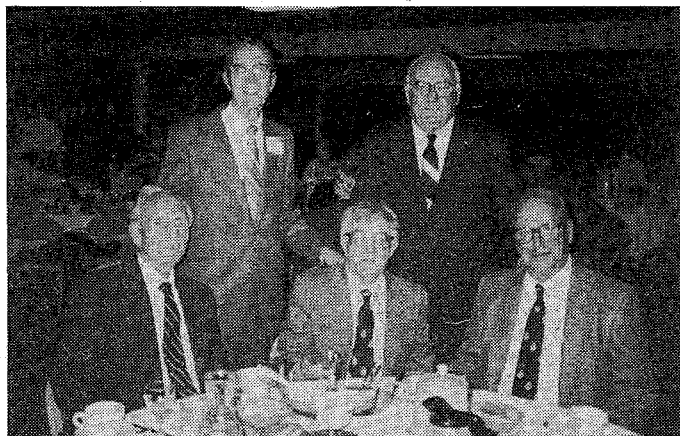
We just received word from Paul Robinson '32 that his brother Wade passed away in Spokane on December 26, 1988. He passed away from lung cancer.

In 1983 the University of North Dakota presented Brother Wade Robinson with the Sioux Award (the highest recognition given to an alumnus) for his national leadership in the health field. Wade was a fellow of the American College of OB-GYN, was president of the Pacific Northwest OB-GYN Association, the Washington State Obstetrical Association, and the Spokane Surgical Society. His publications included many papers on infertility, breast cancer, and pelvic obstetric complications. He was nationally known and respected.

Wade was a native of Garrison, and came to UND and joined Delt in 1932. Wade graduated with a B.S. from UND in 1936, a B.S. in Medicine in 1937, and received his M.D. degree from Washington University in St. Louis in 1939.

He was called into military service for WWII as a surgeon and as a Captain in the Medical Corps. In April, 1942 he was captured by the Japanese in Bataan. For the next 3½ years he was a POW and served as a prison camp physician for our captured soldiers, first in the Philippines and later in Japan. He was a survivor of the famous Bataan Death March, and he used his medical skills and his will to help others to survive this incredible ordeal. After returning to the United States, he took a four year residency in Obstetrics and Gynecology and settled in Spokane, Washington in 1952.

His wife Dorothy passed away on October 1, 1986. They are survived by three sons — Stewart, Bob and John. Condolences can be sent to son John D. Robinson, South 4127 LaMonte, Spokane, WA 99203. We have been notified that several are sending a memorial to the Delt Educational Foundation.

\$108,000 Endowment Drive Kicked Off — \$42,000 So Far . . .

"A stitch in time saves nine". That sizes up the situation the House Corporation finds itself in. After paying off the Metropolitan Loan a couple years ago, we decided to forego intensive fund raising and rely on annual sustaining gifts from a goodly number of alumni who remember Delt each year. We were pleased to have raised \$300,000 since we opened the new Shelter in 1979, and to be able to provide over \$14,000 each year for scholarships, achievement awards, and leadership programs. We thought our job was done. We are a leader on campus and in the Fraternity world.

We reviewed the statistics of our \$120,000 loan with our National Fraternity and we were shocked. After nine (9) years, we have paid over \$76,000 in interest and only \$11,200 in principal. We are facing paying an additional \$90,000 in interest with monthly payments. That is a lot of money that we would rather have go to deserving North Dakota Delts. \$166,000 of interest on a \$120,000 loan opened our eyes.

The Board of Directors decided it was in the best interest of the chapter and the future of Fraternity if we would raise the money to pay off the loan. We hope our alumni agree. It has been over ten years since many of our alumni have contributed, and we hope this cause will arouse their interest and participation, as well as all of our faithful annual contributors.

Jim Lewis '55 and Neil Fleming '65 have agreed to co-chair the \$108,000 endowment drive which is scheduled to be completed in two years. John Tredwell '83 will be serving as Development Director and help

organize the efforts. The alumni volunteers so far include: Stan Moe '32, George Allen '36, Merlin Dewing '56, Tillman Stevens '31, Scotty Cranna '30, Lyle Fering '36, Vince Reuter '41, Duane Williams '53, Gary Muralt '59, Lew Schoeneman '58, Robert Dahl '64, Kent McGregor '69, Bruce Gjovig '74, Steve Geelan '77, Tom Sallander '77, Robert Muhs '77, Mike Bresnahan '82, Brent Koth '82, William Tipton '85, and Robert Henkes '86. More alumni are being recruited to be fund raising leaders.

\$42,000 has been committed towards this endowment so far from about fifty (50) alumni. That is a great start, and is indicative of a successful effort. The major gifts committee is largely responsible for this great start, and the members of the committee are George Allen, Tillman Stevens, Stan Moe and Merlin Dewing. Over \$50,000 is anticipated from their efforts, with gifts ranging from \$1,000 to \$5,000.

It has been ten years since many alumni have contributed. Others contribute every year. If every alumni participated with \$10 each month for the next two years, (\$240), our goal of \$108,000 can easily be met by our 490 alumni on our mailing list. With your help, we will meet our goal, pay off the remaining mortgage, increase our endowment, and be able to provide more scholarships, achievement awards and leadership programs. We look forward to your favorable response to our call to pledge Delt again!
