FEIDLER VISITS CHAPTER

Brother Robert Feidler '71, '74, spoke at the UND Law School and at the chapter on November 4th as part of the National Speakers Program which the Delta Tau Delta Educational Foundation sponsors. Feidler is President of the American Bankruptcy Institute, and is spokesman for the U.S. Courts as Legislative and Public Relations Office for the federal branch of government. Bob works closely with the Supreme Court, the Executive Branch and the US Senate and House Judiciary Committees. No previous UND graduate, or North Dakotan, has risen so high in the administration of the US courts.



Brother Feidler joined the chapter for a Monday night meal, followed by a fireside chat with 70 members, pledges and alumni in the living room. Bob spoke about his experiences in Desert Storm, where he was one of 50 members of a special task force to restructure the country of Kuwait, and afterwards working with the Kurds in northern Iraq who were refugees looking for assistance. His official hosts at the Shelter were Chapter President Jon Furman '91 and Pledge Class President Jason Peterson '94. Alumni guests were Scott and Anna Cranna '30, Joel Medd '69, Kent McGregor '69, Tom Hanson '69 and Bruce Gjovig '74. Bob spoke fondly of his days at the chapter and of his lifelong friendships formed then. He encouraged the members to get involved and make the most of their time with the Fraternity.

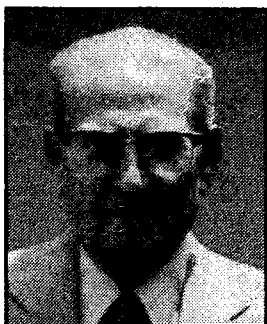
Feidler has an extensive history in Washington, DC, which includes areas of federal court reform, the Constitution, federal rules of evidence, bankruptcy law and the federal magistrate system. He went to Washington as an aide to Senator Quentin Burdick after graduating from the UND Law School in 1974. He served with a number of subcommittees with the Senate Judiciary Committee including their Subcom-

mittee on the Constitution where Bob was on the front lines of such issues as abortion, school prayer, busing, ERA, balanced budget, bankruptcy, and most civil rights issues. He also served as chief counsel and staff director on the Subcommittee on Patents, Copyrights and Trademarks from 1986 to 1987, and suggested to Bruce Gjovig '74 that North Dakota should secure a Patent and Trademark Depository Library which happened in 1991 at the Chester Fritz Library. In 1987 he was recruited to the judicial branch of government to work with the other branches of government, especially the US Senate and House.

In 1991, Feidler was selected as President of the American Bankruptcy Institute. Bob was a founding member of the ABI in 1982, and has served on its board of directors and executive committee since its inception. The ABI is the largest bankruptcy related organization in the country, and bankruptcy is the fastest growing area of the law. Feidler said "every major firm has opened a bankruptcy department, and bankruptcy filings hit 1 million in 1991, affecting tens of millions of people". Bob visited about the 30,000 asbestos cases (and 70,000 pending cases) and their financial impact on the country. Many of the big companies have been put into bankruptcy over the use of asbestos up to four decades ago. While with the Senate Judiciary Committee's Subcommittee on the Consitution, Bob played the lead staff role in the Senate's development of the Bankruptcy Reform Act of 1978. He was also a major participant in the bankruptcy legislation of 1984 and 1986. Although precluded from practicing law in his current position, he has remained active in bankruptcy circles and the ABI.

LEON JORGENSEN ESTABLISHES ENDOWMENT



Leon Jorgenson '33 of Anaheim, CA established an endowment of \$15,000 through the Delta Tau Delta Educational Foundation for music scholarships and financial need. Brother Jorgenson wishes to help those in financial need, as well as recognize deserving members of the

Fraternity who are taking an active interest in music at UND and within the chapter. Criteria in making the award should include enthusiasm for music, leadership for singing Fraternity songs, and participation in UND music groups such as the Concert Choir, Concert or Jazz Band, Varsity Bards, etc. Leon was a music major at UND receiving a B.S. in Education in 1933. He was a native of Grand Forks.

Leon asked that financial need be taken into consideration especially if it may mean the difference of continuing their education and keeping up their membership in the Fraternity. Brother Jorgenson wanted to keep the fellows in school and was mindful that many of our members are struggling to make ends meet as they work part-time during the school year and have a couple of jobs during the summer. Wages have not kept up with increased college costs causing tight budgets.

Leon was an accountant in California for many years, and he retired in 1984 as Officer Manager for Placentia Mutual Orange Association. He made many

summer trips to North Dakota in the 1980s to visit friends and relatives, and get together with friends from the 164th Infantry. Leon's brothers Earl Jorgenson '30 (deceased January 1970) and Donald Jorgenson '39 of Great Falls, Montana are also members of the Fraternity.

Bruce Gjovig said "Brother Jorgenson has made a significant gift to the Fraternity to help young Delts stay in school and pursue their interests in music. Many Delts will be helped because of Leon's generosity, giving them a boost when they need it most." Leon also made a \$5,000 gift to pave the parking lot behind the chapter house, making a total gift of \$20,000 this year. This is among the largest single gifts the Fraternity has ever received, making Brother Jorgenson a member of the Delt Benefactors Giving Club.

The first recipients of the Jorgenson Scholarships are Reed Endersbe of Grand Forks, and James Bervig of Williston. Both are active in the Fraternity, and in music. Reed is a sophomore majoring in criminal justice and is the current Rush Chairman. He also served as Pledge Educator and Assistance Treasurer. Reed is an excellent piano player and plays for charity concerts. He is also a music DJ with XL93 radio. James Bervig is a junior majoring in public relations and has served on the fund raising and public relations committees of the house. Jim is active with Varsity Bards, UND Honor Choir, All-State Choir, and has a background in trumpet and piano. The first Jorgenson Scholarships were announced at the Homecoming Banquet October 19th.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

When Halloween came around Delta Xi saw the opportunity to take Community Service to yet another level. With promotional help from XL 93 we transformed the shelter into a Haunted House. The whole chapter got together and we are proud to say we did an excellent job when the night had ended. A steady stream of kids and parents went through from 8 to 12 p.m. We made almost \$1000 and then donated it all to the United Way's Rape Center.

FRATERNITY TUITION

It has been said many times that the experience outside of the classroom is as valuable as the classes themselves, especially in areas of leadership training and developing teamwork skills. Knowledge requires people skills for successful execution. A civil society also requires social responsibility, being our brother's keeper. Others have stated that the Fraternity doubled their college education as it gave them many fine friendships. The value of the Fraternity experience and education is great, and the fact that more than 80% of the leaders in business, government and education are Greek is no accident, especially when you consider that only 2% of the adult population is Greek affiliated.

Today tuition at UND is \$2040 per year, about \$8,000 for four years. This is a reasonable sum of money for an accredited public university and at most private colleges that sum is over \$10,000 per year, or \$40,000 of tuition for four years. For a typical university student at UND (non-aviation), the total cost of a year of college is \$7,000 (tuition, room and board, books, social, clothes, etc.), or about \$28,000 for four years. In four years, less than \$800 goes to Fraternity dues, pledge fees and initiation costs, or less than three percent (3%). For less than the equivalent of one semester of tuition (or about 10 credit hours), we doubled our education at Delta Tau Delta - good value at an excellent price.

We are able to do so much at such low costs for our members because we are a volunteer organization calling upon alumni to serve as advisors, house corporation officers, and trustees of the educational foundation. The educational foundation has been able to underwrite costs for much of the programming that has allowed us to be a leader in the Fraternity world sending our members to leadership training, bringing in speakers, providing computers, etc. Our overhead costs are low. Allowing our undergraduates to do work for themselves is instructional, efficient and cost-effective. We do not always get peak performance, but great lessons are also learned through mistakes and adversity. Learning by doing in a win-win environment works well.

Delts will continue to provide a quality education, and at a modest price. We need not apologize for charging our members more than other fraternities because we offer more i.e. higher value and a quality educational experience. We also reward excellence and achievement more than any other chapter in the nation. Over \$100,000 has been given to members in academic scholarships and achievement awards since 1978 - a record of great accomplishment by our alumni. It is most appropriate for our alumni to remember what benefits they received through the Delt experience. To contribute to the tuition of Delts of promise and potential is a worthwhile investment. The most lasting legacy any human being can leave is to give someone else a boost on the way up. Thus we help them raise their heads above the crowd.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Brothers:

As we prepare to go into our second semester of the school year, the status of the Fraternity is good. Some highlights:

- Membership is at 72, including 23 pledges for the fall semester.
- We placed 4th of 16 fraternities academically last Spring.
- 100% of our active chapter has participated in Delts Talking About Alcohol; 50% have participated in follow-on workshops. National gave Delta Xi a program award for being #1 in DTAA of 124 chapters.
- Delta Xi has been recognized as the chapter with the largest delegation at national conferences - our members are taking advantage of the leadership training that is available.
- Delts had the largest delegation (21 Delts) at the Mid-America Interfraternity Conference on November 15, a full day of workshops.
- \$31,000 from the Educational Foundation is budgeted for awards, scholarships, and leadership programs - the best alumni support of any fraternity on campus, or any chapter in the nation.
- Bob Feidler was hosted for a fireside chat with our National Speakers program.
- New ritual robes were purchased by the Educational Foundation, replacing the original robes from chartering in 1935.
- New computer room cabinets were installed making the space more efficient and allowing for additional computers. A new IBM computer was also purchased by the Educational Foundation.
- The House Corporation paved the parking spaces behind the chapter house, so mud no longer gets tracked in on the carpets.
- A Brotherhood Room has replaced the bar (no more alcohol at chapter functions), providing a space for the brothers to hang out together and let off steam.

Looking ahead, we need to do further planning and goal setting and an all-house retreat has been set for January 11. The new officers have already met to visit about common goals and objectives, and the full chapter needs to have their voice. We need to improve member participation at chapter meals and meetings, and encourage more members to take leadership positions. By next fall, we hope to have more than 80 members, be in top quartile in grades (above the all-men's average), and improve programming in the areas of public relations, academics, rush.

Initiation of the Fall Pledge class is set for Friday, January 17th. Alumni are invited to join the ceremony scheduled for 7:00 p.m. at the Shelter. We memorize our parts, and we would like to show off our new ritual robes!

HOUSE CORPORATION REPORT

The Delta Tau Delta House Corporation had its fall meeting on October 19, 1991 in conjunction with homecoming.

The main item of news is that the parking lot directly behind the chapter house and the alley have been paved. This greatly improves the mud situation behind the house.

To accomplish this project a fund raising project was launched headed by house corporation president, Joel Medd '69. Assisting with this fund raising were Scotty Cranna '30 and Bruce Gjovig '74. Through a solicitation letter and other means approximately \$13,000 was raised for the project. The paving was originally projected to cost about \$22,000. Through the terrific efforts of Chapter Advisor Tom Hanson and house members the lot and alley were completed for about \$12,500.

A great many thanks go to Tom for his efforts and skills as a civil engineer who took off the time to get this project done right during his busy season. The fund raising efforts were aided significantly by a gift of \$5,000 from Leon Jorgenson '33, who visited the chapter house during the summer, and saw for himself how rough the gravel alley was.

It is the plan of the house corporation to work with the Educational Foundation to attempt to pave the parking lot across the alley next summer.

The House Corporation was pleased with the progress of the active chapter in timely paying the rent to the House Corporation and even paying significant rent during the summer.

The current slate of officers and directors were reelected with Joel Medd as President; Ken Johnson, Vice President; Todd Potas, Secretary; and Kent McGregor as Treasurer. Current Directors are Neil Flemming, Bill Schoen, and Don Toman. Also serving as Ex Officio Directors are Chapter Advisor Tom Hanson and Active Chapter President, Bill Dolny.

CAMPUS ACTIVITIES

Having such a strong aviation base, many of the brothers are involved in aviation related organizations. The chapter currently has three members in the Wilderness Pilot's Association, they are Paul Skjeveland, Aaron Keenan, and Hunter Bass. On the Student Aviation Management Association sit Bill Dolny, Dan Johnson, and John Niemeier. Mike Gillen is a tour guide at the center for Aerospace Sciences and a member of the University of North Dakota Flying Club.

Musically we are represented by John Niemeier and Brian Christiansen in the Varsity Bards. John Niemeier was also a member of the Homecoming Court.

We also had a brother involved in major — related organizations. Mike Gillen is a member of the Criminal Justice Club. Elton Brekke is a member of the Marketing Club. Travis Hall is a member of Gamma Theta Upsilon, and Aaron Keenan is a member of Semper Fi Society, and association of Marines.

In the area of varsity sports we are represented by Bill Kehoe and Steve Sullivan on the Cross Country team, and by Steve Sullivan and Karl Kjeldsen on the Track team. Cyle Cantrell has recently joined the UND Football team as a kicker.

As you can see we are very well represented in many various facets of campus life. Many of the brothers try their best to be involved, not only in the chapter, but in the University as a whole.

The chapter is going strong in the field on intramural athletics. This fall the softball team won their division, and placed third overall. As usual there is so much interest in hockey, that we are currently supporting two teams. We are expecting to be highly competitive this year. Intramurals are an excellent opportunity for the brothers to spend quality time together, and at the same time build and improve relations with other houses on campus.

MEDD ELECTED PRESIDING JUDGE



Joel D. Medd has been elected as the Presiding District Judge for the Northeast Central District for North Dakota. Medd graduated from the University of North Dakota undergraduate school in 1969 and from Law School in 1975.

The four district judges and the county judge in the Northeast Central District, all chambered in Grand Forks, elected Medd to be the Presiding Judge for the next three year term. The Presiding Judge makes the administrative decisions in the district such as case assignments and budgeting.

Medd has been a district judge in Grand Forks since 1979 when he was appointed by Governor Art Link. Prior to that he was a county judge in Minnewaukan and Williston, North Dakota as well as serving as a municipal judge, tribal judge and county justice.

Medd was appointed as a county judge even before graduating from law school and was the youngest county judge in North Dakota at that time. He now becomes the youngest Presiding Judge in the state at age 44.

Medd has been honored in the past by receiving the Bronze Star for service in Vietnam, the Outstanding Young North Dakota Award presented by the Jaycees, Phi Alpha Delta Outstanding Alumni Award, and the North Dakota State Bar Association Pro Bono Publico Award.

Judge Medd presently serves as the President of the Delt House Corporation. He resides in Grand Forks with his wife Amy and her son Phillip.
