PINEO, OTREMBA: FIRST GRADUATES OF LEADERSHIP ACADEMY

Chuck Pineo '93 and Mike Otremba '93 are two of the first 15 graduates of the Delta Tau Delta Leadership Academy. The five-day intensive program was offered for the first time from July 30 to August 4, 1992 just prior to Karnea '92. The original fifteen participants were chosen from undergraduate Delts who applied from across the nation. Attendance was selective to reach those undergraduates with the greatest potential for leadership. Selection was based on chapter and campus involvement, academic background, and leadership. All expenses were covered by the national Delta Tau Delta Educational Foundation in Indiana. Academic credit was available through Texas Tech University.

The Leadership Academy has been in the planning phase for nearly five years, and a \$1.2 million endowment was raised to support the program through the national Delta Tau Delta Educational Foundation. The goal of the Academy is to teach participants the competencies of leadership, rather than simply the traits of leadership. A unique opportunity was created to have a valuable, lasting impact on the lives of undergraduate Delts. The Academy is interested in developing leadership skills for a lifetime, as well as skills useful for the success of a chapter leader.

The curriculum was written by Bud Murphy '38 a Penn State Delt who is an expert on leadership and management. Much of Murphy's work was based on Warren Bennis' book titled *Leaders: The Strategies for Taking Charge.* The Academy concentrated on the four competencies of leadership: trust, communication, vision and management of self. John Hancock of the Central Office Staff serves as the Director of

Leadership Development. The facilitators were Delts who were tops in their fields, who shared their lessons on leadership from their experiences and perspective in their professional lives.

Brother Otremba observes "The Leadership Academy is an experience that I will always cherish. I feel honored to have been chosen for the inaugural class." Brother Pineo added "As expected of any Delt function or endeavor, the Leadership Academy was top of the line and had extraordinary support from alumni." Both look forward to helping establish the local Leadership Academy with support from the Delta Tau Delta Educational Foundation. A two-day Academy is scheduled in January 1993 for 20 North Dakota Delts.

Chuck Pineo is a senior majoring in Physical Education from Minnedosa, Manitoba and currently serves as the External Vice President of the Chapter. He has also served as Pledge Educator, Rush Chairman and Intramurals Chairman as well as being active on campus by being Delta Xi's Chairman of Greek Week '91. In March he facilitated the first "Playing the Game" date rape pro-

gram for Delta Xi with the Gamma Phi Betas. Both chapters had a high turnout, and all participants gained insight into the varying sensitivities of male and female viewpoints, the different perspectives of date rape, and ways to prevent it.

Mike Otremba is a senior majoring in Airway Science from Rosemount, Minnesota. He currently serves as Pledge Educator, and has served as

Ellinger Named to Undergraduate Council

During the 1992 Karnea, Barry Ellinger had the distinguished honor of being selected for the Undergraduate Council. Barry is a sophomore majoring in Aviation from Mt. Pleasant, Michigan. Last spring he was awarded the Edward X. Hallenberg Red Key Award as the outstanding pledge for Fall '91. Since being initiated he has served the chapter as chairman of the Public Relations and Speaker Committees.

Barry will serve on the Undergraduate Council for a term of two years and is currently the Administrative Assistant on the Council. Within the three days prior to Karnea the Undergraduate Council met with the Arch Chapter and decided on the issues that would be brought before the chapters for final vote. Barry also had the opportunity of speaking with Mark about his experience on the UGC and he stated that working on the Undergraduate Council showed him what different chapters and men from across the country can accomplish in working together. At the January meeting of the UGC in Indianapolis a final decision will be made on a national philanthropy, establishing a date rape education program and working to improve the alcohol policy.

GJOVIG SPEAKS AT KARNEA

For the first in recent memory, a North Dakota Delt was invited to make a presentation at a Karnea. At the 1992 Heritage Karnea held August 5-8 in Chicago, Bruce Gjovig '74 was asked to make a presentation on "Shelter Fund Raising," sharing the North Dakota success story with other alumni leaders who were in attendance. About 70 alumni attended the session, learning how North Dakota raised over \$850,000 in cash and deferred gifts for housing, academic scholarships, achievement awards, computers and leadership programming.


Gjovig recounted the terrific record of accomplishments that have been made since 1977 when the Delta Tau Delta Educational Foundation was started. Not only was \$850,000 raised which permitted many improvements to be made, but also stimulated superior housing, solid property management, a growing endowment and scholarship program, excellent alumni support and involvement, a top 20 chapter in the country, and most importantly it supports a favorable educational environment for young Delts. It has been more successful than anyone dared dream it might be 15 years ago.

Key factors for success that were highlighted was a constant effort by many alumni, undergraduate support and performance, the tax-deductible status, clear goals and statement of need, having clubs that recognize givers at all levels, and allowing alumni to make annual gifts to join Giving Clubs. Gjovig stated that if North Dakota could do it, so can any chapter in Delta Tau Delta.

Giovig served as one of eight members on the National Housing Commission for Delta Tau Delta which met 10 days over the last year to deliberate how to address the housing needs of the Fraternity. The Housing Commission presented an action plan to the Arch Chapter that calls for raising \$30 million over the next five years to improve housing for our students. Several creative financing machanisms were suggested including utilizing Educational Foundations such as North Dakota's. A plan was also submitted for improved property management, a new House Corporation manual and suggestions made for improving the "culture" in chapter houses. The Arch Chapter received the report with enthusiam, and the Fraternity is positioned to be the leader in responding to the needs of aging chapter housing we face coast to coast. North Dakota's success story helped develop the blue print for the plan developed by the Housing Commission.

Nationwide, 65 national fraternities own some 6,000 fraternity houses on 805 college campuses for the benefit of over 400,000 undergraduates. Half of the chapter houses are over 50 years old, and all the property is worth about \$7.5 billion. Few houses have been renovated or replaced in the last 20 years, and almost all suffer from deferred maintenance. Less than 20% of the house corporations meet on a regular

basis to provide adult business supervision. Less than 5% of the house corporations have significant financial reserves. Rents are too low, paid sporadically, many times caused by higher chapter accounts receivable, often over \$10,000 per chapter. Nationwide, the largest asset fraternities have is their property. However houses are usually poorly managed, tired, rents are too low to keep property maintained, and often underinsured. \$3 billion is needed to bring chapter houses up to standard nationwide. Delta Tau Delta can be a leader in addressing housing problems by leadership and creativity in financing, property management and alumni involvement. Your North Dakota chapter serves as an example for others to emulate.

House and Grounds Report


