## Stan Moe '32 to receive UND Honorary Degree

Stanly A. Moe '32 will be receiving an Honorary Doctorate Degree in Engineering from the University of North Dakota on Sunday, May 16th, during commencement exercises. Only a handful of graduates have been so honored by the University and the North Dakota University System.

Stanley A. Moe is one of the six founders of Daniel, Mann, Johnson and Mendenhall (DMJM), one of the world's largest architectural, planning, and engineering firms. Stanley Moe is a pioneer in his profession, expanding architecture and engineering services to an international scale, traveling over the world to establish more than two dozen foreign offices. The imprint of Moe's talents are also firmly imprinted in the United States Space program, since he directed the design of the prototype Titan I facilities. Retired since 1979, he has remained active professionally through consulting. The 1984 Olympic facilities in California and the design of 400 million dollar airport in Algiers, are two such consulting projects he completed while in retirement.

A native of Ross, North Dakota, Moe attended UND from 1930 to 1932. At UND, he studied engineering and joined the fraternity. He then transferred to the University of Minnesota with a Bachelor's degree in architecture.

## Delta Xi named Top Fraternity at UND!

During Greek Week '93, Delta Xi was presented with the President's Commendation of Excellence Award. Greek recognizing excellence in programming from March 1992 to February 1993. This is the first time in recent memory that the Delts have been named the outstanding fraternity on campus. Two sororities, Gamma Phi Beta and Pi Beta Phi, were given higher honors, named to the President's Award of Greek Excellence. UND President Kendell Baker presented the Awards on April 19th.

Two months ago, Delta Xi was named to the Court of Honor of Delta Tau Delta recognizing it as one of the top 20 chapters in the nation. It is the second highest award given by the Fraternity. It is the Chapters second Court of Honor in two years, and third in the Chapters history, the other coming in 1985. The chapter has also been recognized nationally as having one of the top programs, in Delts Talk About Alcohol, Educational scholarships and awards, Alumni relations, and being the first to operate a local leadership academy.

#### A Women pilot pioneer

Delt "sweetheart" Jean Haley Harper '75 flew her first trip as a captain on United Airlines with her husband on November 9, 1992. The flight was the airlines first husband-wife flight crew in which the pilot was the later and the copilot being the former. Jean was United's third woman pilot, hired just weeks after two other female pilot's were hired.

Jean dreamed of being a pilot since she was nine years old. She remembers writing an essay explaining she wanted to be an airline pilot, but received an "F" because her thirdgrade teacher felt it was an unrealistic fairy tale, for there were no female airline pilots at the time. However her father has a different reaction to the paper. He was a crop duster and told Jean, "You can do anything you want." Jean credits her father for the determination it took to prove the naysayers wrong and do what "couldn't be done."

Jean enrolled at the University of North Dakota in 1971, and she soon joined the Delta Zeta Sorority. As an aviation major, she quickly became friends with the Delts, who were the "aviation fraternity" on campus. When Jean enrolled there were still no women airline pilots. But, taking the chance, she was still willing to spend the time to get her ratings and flying hours. During the four years, she became UND's first female flight instructor, and held a variety of jobs such as cloud seeder, night airmail pilot, and charter pilot.

One of her favorite gifts was from fellow flight student Tracy Van Den Berg '77 who told her that Frontier airlines had hired Emily Howell. She remembers thinking "Oh my God, It happened. The last obstacle has fallen. I finally have an honest to goodness role model."

After graduating in 1975, the airline industry was in a down cycle and were not hiring. After several years of flying in a number of jobs, she met Vic Harper, her future husband, flying for Meridan Air Cargo. She used to switch shifts with Vic's co-pilot so they could fly together. Three years after they met, they married. Jean then landed a job as a 727 flight engineer with United Airlines. In her 15 years with united has been in the cockpit of 727's, 737's, 757's, and 767's.

Jean and Vic have successful juggled two airline careers with two children - Annie 7, and

Sam 3. In 1985, Jean became United's first pregnant pilot, before United had a maternity leave policy. Jean and Vic currently reside at 8529 East Nichols Avenue, Englewood, CO 80112.



# Controversy surrounds Greek computers

Heated debate over student funding for greek computers have left campus students in rage. The problem arised when student body president Scott Aiserman approved matching funds for each Fraternity and Sorority to receive one computer. Approved because two years ago student funds were given to residence halls to purchase computers. The Greek community believes that the student senate is acting justly. But those in residence halls fell they have been treated unfairly because the Greeks represent a small portion of the campus and do not deserve special privileges.

At the center of this conflict is the University newspaper *The Dakota Student*. On one side, articles have been written expressing extreme concern over the "obvious favoritism" towards the Greek System. Comparing this incident to the same kind of prejudice experienced by blacks in the 1950's. While the Greek community has been quick to respond. "If the Greek populations less than 12 percent, we along do not elect the student senate."

(STAN MOE Cont.) Working several years in the Twin Cities and Duluth areas after graduation, Moe dedicated two years to designing military facilities in Africa during World War II. Then, in 1947, he moved to Los Angeles where he established a successful firm. During the Korean years, "non-essential" construction was curtailed, so Moe left his company and became a shareholder of Daniel, Mann, Johnson and Mendenhall.

When DMJM began, it was a small company which concentrated on designing school buildings. In the next 20 years, the business grew to more than 1,000 employees in the US., with offices and hundreds of employees around the world. Moe played a major role in the oversees expansion of the company by overseeing the firms first project in Japan in 1952. He is a pioneer in his profession by expanding architecture and engineering service to an international scale, who established more than two dozen foreign operations himself, while few firms were engaged in international work. He managed European operations until 1956, when he returned to the US, to become DMJM's general manager and executive vice president. At DMJM, Moe held the positions of vice president, partner, principal owner, and member of the DMJM Board of directors.

DMJM had a major impact on the US. space program, beginning with the design of the launch pad for the first manned space flight at Cape Canaveral, Florida and later with the design of many research, manufacturing and launch facilities for other aerospace programs, including the space shuttle. Clients were most of the major companies in the industry, as well as the US. government.

Moe had a significant role in the US. space program through organizing and directing the firm's many design efforts relating to both military and non-military space programs of the US. government involving such vehicles as the Atlas, Jupiter, Thor, Titan I, the lunar excursion module and the space shuttle.

As chairman of the control committee of a joint venture, he directed the design of all prototype and training facilities for the Titan I missile system as well as several of the operational bases. He also personally directed the design of several of the ground support and launch related facilities for the space shuttle program on both the East and West coasts.

He has worked on international projects to benefit underdeveloped parts of the world, which have raised the standard of living in those Some of these projects include the areas. drilling of 400 water wells in northeast regional highway Thailand, establishing departments in the Cameroons, and developing a system of elementary schools in rural Jordan. He organized the master plans for two large medical centers and supporting communities in Saudi Arabia, with total project costs in excess of \$3.5 billion. He has organized and managed very large projects on a world-wide basis.

Active in many professional organizations, Moe has memberships in the American institute of Architects (AIA); the California Council, AIA; the society of American Military Engineers; and the Far East Society of Architects and Engineers. He received the UND Sioux Award in October 1985.

He received recognition through feature stories in *Fortune, Business Week, Engineering News Record, Consulting Engineer*, and several other trade publications. Before retirement, he wrote several articles on management of A-E firms. Moe and his company received many awards for design and technical achievement. Stan and his wife, Doris, live at 447 South Plymouth Blvd, Los Angeles CA 90020, and in retirement enjoy international travel and photography.

#### Pledge Presidents Report


The Pledge Class attended Delts Talking about Alcohol Sunday April 4th.
