Four years ago Delta Xi Chapter made it their goal to become one of the top ten chapters of Delta Tau Delta International Fraternity. On February 13, 1994 at the Regional Conference in Champaign, Illinois this goal was achieved. Delta Xi was recognized for the first time in their history as a Hugh Shields Chapter.

The Hugh Shields Award (Huey) is given annually by the International Fraternity to recognize excellence in every aspect of chapter programming. The award recognizes the top ten of Delta Tau Delta's 128 chapters. Delta Xi received a Hugh Shields plaque that will hang in the chapter library, and the ever impressive Hugh Shields Flag. The Flag models the purple, white, and gold flag of the fraternity. Written along the top is the Greek word προτιμοι, which translates to "The Best Among Equals."

Delta Xi also received their third consecutive Court of Honor, which recognizes the top 20 of Delta Tau Delta's 128 chapters. The Hugh Shields top ten designation was a result of hard work and dedication in areas such as academics, campus, community and rush, membership

education, ritual improvement, and chapter management.

Delta Xi will get to display its Hugh Shields flag in the shelter for one year. When the chapter receives its fifth Hugh Shields, the flag will be retired and remain with the chapter in recognition of this achievement. With the momentum the chapter has gained in the past four years Delta Xi will retire its first Huey in 1998!

Delta Xi also received "Delt 2000" recognition for our outstanding alumni participation and involvement. This award is given to chapters who have at least 15 active alumni that each alumnus spends a minimum of two days a year helping the fraternity and its members. This includes an active house corporation, Chapter Advisor, and Faculty Advisor. The entire undergraduate chapter would like to extend a thank you to all alumni who helped make the Hugh Shields and Delt 2000 awards possible.

We are all saddened by the tragic death of Brother Erickson. Brother Erickson was the first officer on Northwest Airlink Flight 5719, which crashed in Hibbing, MN, on Dec. 1, 1993. It is hard to grasp the realization of this accident that has struck so close to home for many of us.

Chad joined Delta Tau Delta in 1986 and graduated in 1990. Chad touched all of our lives in many ways. If it was not getting some friendly advice about academics from him when he was the Academic Chair for the Chapter, it was taking a ride of thrill with him in his new Ford Sho or Escort, or it was just simply listening in amazement as he played the piano. Chad was very goal oriented and put himself into everything he did. Chad helped many of us achieve our own goals by completing our check rides with him when he was a phase check pilot at the University. Chad reached his goal when he completed his life long dream of flying for an airline.

Forty-four Delts were in attendance for Brother Ericksons' Funeral. An abundance of wonderful memories was told among each other, and ensured that Brother Erickson would not be forgotten in our hearts. His memories will go on to help others with a scholarship endowment in memory of Brother Erickson that is being established by his brothers, family, and friends Delta's Educational within Delta Tau provide scholarships for Foundation to outstanding aviation majors.

Chad will always be in our memories. Every time we fly he will be with us, everytime we look into the sky we know he will be there.

Adopt a School

We have an exciting new community service project here at the University of North Dakota. What is even more exciting, is that this program was brought to this campus by one of our own brothers.

Matt Oosting, Interfraternity Council Vice-President, is one of the two Student Coordinators of the Adopt-A-School program. This is a community service project that is geared towards the "Education of Youth." Sound familiar? I hope so. Matt learned about the program while attending the Undergraduate Interfraternity Institute last summer in Indianapolis. Matt was one of two UND students to attend the conference sponsored by the National Interfraternity Institute.

The Adopt-A-School program is fully endorsed by the Interfraternity and the Panhellic Councils at the University of North Dakota. West Elementary School, which borders University Park, was approached by UND Greeks to be our adopted school because the principle, Mike Johnson, a UND Greek himself, was so supportive of the program, and because the school was in close proximity to the university community.

The purpose of the program is to help elementary school students with reading, writing, math, science, and other school related activities. The volunteers will be volunteering about one hour a week, some possibly more, providing individual help, or running small groups in the classroom. We all know how important it is to get more personalized attention while receiving an education, and that is what this program provides.

Currently, out of 21 Greek chapters on this campus, about 12 of them have volunteers working with a group of about 25 at West Elementary. So far all of the volunteers have had good experiences at the school and the program has received much needed publicity from the <u>Dakota Student</u> and the <u>Grand Forks</u> Herald.

Stan Moe Establishes Leadership Endowment

Stanley and Doris Moe '34 of Los Angeles, California established an endowment within the Delta Tau Delta Educational Foundation to support the Delt Leadership Academy. A gift of stock was made, and the income from the endowment will be utilized to support the chapter leadership academy.

Stan and Doris wish to encourage leadership development among members of the Fraternity, so Delts would assume additional leadership roles in their careers, communities, associations, etc. The Leadership Academy will be taught from a corporate perspective, with instructors coming from business and industry. This will ensure quality, as well as a strong applications focus rather than theoretical.

Robert Muhs '76 of Apple Valley, Minnesota is chairing the program for the Educational Foundation, with assistance from Merlin Dewing '56 of Darien, Connecticut. Twenty Delts participated in the pilot Leadership academy a year ago, with a two-day curriculum. Additionally four North Dakota Delts have been selected to participate in the National Leadership Academy: Chuck Pineo, Mike Otremba, Dave Sickels, and Aaron Karow. All four were elected to executive positions in the chapter, and Chuck Pineo was elected President of the Intrefraternity Council (IFC).

Stan Moe was one of six founders of Daniel, Mann, Johnson, and Mendenhall (DMJM), one of the world's largest architectural, planning and engineering firms with over 1000 employees in the U.S. and hundreds of staff in many other countries. He was a pioneer in expanding architecture and engineering services to an international scale, established more than two dozen foreign offices himself. After returning to the U.S. to manage the firm, he managed very large and complex projects on a world-wide basis, and played significant leadership roles in the development of the U.S. Space Program. He organized and directed the design for such space vehicles as the Atlas, Jupiter, Thor, Titan I, the lunar excursion module and the space shuttle. He chaired the effort to design all prototype and training facilities for the Titan I missile system, and the ground support and launch facilities for the space shuttle on both East and West coasts. In recognition of those

accomplishments, the University of North Dakota conferred upon Brother Moe an Honorary Doctor of Engineering Degree on May 16, 1993, and he received a Sioux Award in 1985.

A native of Ross, North Dakota, Stan and wife Doris live in Los Angeles, California, where he moved in 1947 to start his own firm.




