My passion for, and belief in, the ideals of Delt remain steady. The Delt Educational Foundation is doing important work to help young men of



President Baker Resigns As of June 30, 1999

Following is a statement made by President Baker on Aug.21:

Despite the excitement, enegy, and anticipation that I always feel when our students arrive for the new school year, today is not a happy one for me. Earlier today the State Board of Higher Education approved a negotiated agreement regarding the terms of my departure as President of the University of North Dakota. As part of this agreement, I have, with great regret and deep sadness, tendered my resignation as President and Professor of Political Science, effective June 30, 1999.

Leaving the University of North Dakota after seven years of service is not what I would have chosen. I had Aviation

thought that my statement at the February board meeting, the zero salary increase approved for me at the June meeting, not to mention the many accomplishments of the past year, had brought the difficulties that occurred in January to a close. However, because of the public criticism that began again on July 1, I have concluded tha an environment does not exist that is conducive to my long term continuance and success as President. I look forward to serving this year, contributing in whatever ways I can to the upcoming legislative session, bringing a number of projects to conclusion, and facilitating the transition to my successor.
